Students are encouraged to work in groups to integrate theoretical knowledge and research skills that they have obtained in taught courses and lectures. They chose a particular topic on social exclusion related for example to immigration, youth poverty, homelessness or racial conflict to study within a particular city or neighbourhood. Initially they read key theoretical texts related to their topic and then they are encouraged to undertake a small research exercise for their study.
