The major objective of this course is to equip students of Sociology with adequate understanding of the specific terminology of their vocational area and also improve their general ability to communicate effectively in English.

In giving emphasis to English as a medium of expression for this scientific area, it tries to provide a good grounding in the use of English in social studies. In that respect, it tries to familiarize the students of Sociology with the language and special terms of this particular area of studies and to prepare them for reading more difficult texts related to this discipline.

The principal method of teaching in this course is by lectures. The students are expected to write down notes during the lectures which will form the basis for

their reading material for the formal examinations. Individual help is given as needed.

The course is intended for students at the intermediate-advanced level. Therefore, those who take it, should be competent in English grammar and vocabulary and also have at least a basic knowledge of sociology in their native language.

## Generally, the students through this course(s), acquire the following competences:

The textbook also contains a glossary of special terms, bibliography and five appendixes:


