- To attract the interest of public and private organizations and companies, in order to support the integration of the Department's graduates into the labor market.
- To expand the employment prospects of the Department's graduates beyond the traditionally established fields of employment. Particular emphasis is placed on creating connections with research centers, NGOs providing social services, communication networks and media, as well as with institutions involved in the planning and implementation of social policy and cultural activities at the level of local government.

(3) SYLLABUS

The internship is carried out continuously for a period of two months. Students follow the working hours of the service or institution to which they have been assigned, and they are expected to comply with the instructions of their supervisors within that setting. The Department does not intervene in this process.

Upon completion of the internship, students are required to submit the following to the Academic Coordinator of the Internship Program:

- a) A written report, on the basis of which they will be evaluated (see below).
- b) A logbook, signed by the service or institution where the internship was conducted.
- c) An evaluation form completed by the service or institution where the internship took place.

In order for the internship to be considered complete, all the above documents must be submitted to the Department, along with any additional documents or completed online forms requested by the Internship Office.
