3. COURSE CONTENT

As one of the largest economic sectors worldwide, tourism has evolved into a key driver of social transformation in modern societies throughout the 20th century. Today, tourism is also increasingly recognized as a significant factor of cultural transformation, as mobility and leisure have become social and cultural practices through which people construct their sense of self, society, nationhood, the past, and the "other." This transformation is often presented in host countries as the result of a region's "natural" competitive advantages. In reality, however, it stems from the social practices of a wide range of economic and political actors, whose actions, practices, and perceptions constitute the primary material of the sociology of tourism.

This seminar explores the emergence of tourism as a modern cultural, economic, and political phenomenon, with a particular emphasis on the case of Greece and the available Greek-language literature. The course adopts a strongly interdisciplinary approach, examining texts that concern the formation, representations, and impacts of Greek tourism across a broad spectrum of disciplines, including sociology, anthropology, spatial studies, economics, and cultural studies.

Students are expected to engage both in the critical reading of texts that have contributed to the study of the significance and role of tourism development in processes of social transformation in Greek society, as well as in the design and implementation of their own small-scale research projects as part of the seminar requirements.

- Cultural representations of Greek tourism: Travel guides and cinema 6.
- 7. Gender representations and dynamics in Greek tourism
- 8. Archaeology, cultural heritage, and cultural policy
- 9. Representations and management of the natural environment in the study of Greek tourism
- Architecture and spatial planning in the production of tourist space 10.
- The problematics of "overtourism" and "touristification" 11.
