The seminar will present the main fields of ethnographic studies on Greece: politics (political behavior, patronage, populism), economy, kinship and gender, religion and ritual, minorities, refugees, etc. In addition, the main theoretical and methodological approaches of anthropologists in Greece will be discussed, as well as ways of integrating Greek ethnography into the broader context of anthropological approaches to Mediterranean and Balkan societies.
