(3)SYLLABUS

This course aims to explore the reciprocal relationship between housing, as a fundamental human need, and social exclusion, by examining the multiple dimensions and manifestations of this issue. Through the mapping of key theoretical approaches and the presentation of case studies, the course analyzes the political, social, economic, and cultural factors that contribute to the emergence of housing insecurity, homelessness, and housing exclusion, in both international and national contexts. The course also examines policy responses to housing-related problems, including integration and reintegration strategies, and considers their impact on the individuals affected. In addition, the course delves into the processes through which housing inequality intersects with other forms of inequality—such as those based on race, gender, income, and unequal access to healthcare and education.

The 13 lectures are structured into 5 thematic units:
